President Obama has commuted more sentences than his seven predecessors combined. He has used that power to release many nonviolent drug offenders, many of whom were sentenced under laws that no longer exist. In 2015, Obama granted clemency to 46 of these prisoners. Sometimes, though, getting out is the easy part. Behind each of those commuted sentences is a person whose life has been dramatically complicated by prison.

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Nine years later, after having had countless appeals and pleas for clemency rejected, Bleach, 52, is returning home. He would, however, have the right to grant clemency to prisoners on federal death row, which currently houses 29 men. It's a proud tradition, as you know, of executive clemency that began with President Harry Truman.

Vignali had served six years of a fifteen-year sentence for his role in a drug-trafficking operation when he was granted clemency by the then-United-States-President Bill Clinton, one of 176 commutations and pardons performed by Clinton during his last few hours in office.

Clemency Project 2014 ended in December 2016. Yet clemency is more essential than ever before. Because Congress abolished parole for federal prisoners and strictly limited their appeal rights, a presidential commutation is one of the only ways for a person to receive relief from an excessive sentence.
