To Woodrow Wilson's chagrin, it incorporated very few of his original Fourteen Points, although it did include the League of Nations that Wilson had long sought. Isolationists in the United States, deeply opposed to the League, led the opposition to the Treaty, which was never ratified by the Senate. (764)

That Wilsonian vision called for the removal of all economic barriers, "free trade," while maintaining U.S. interventionist prerogatives; diplomatic transparency, self-determination for Europe's national minorities, and a "League of Nations" to mediate international disputes.
